We begin the year as we mean to go on: packing our bags and passports and heading overseas.

A slim beauty, Cynthia Zarin's In Italy transports us to the streets and piazzas of Venice, Rome and beyond (don't worry: we'll return to Italy later in the year with Natalia Ginzburg . . .). In February, it's a joy to welcome back Elisa Shua Dusapin to our shelves – and, in March, to the UK, on tour – with Vladivostok Circus, an elegant, nuanced exploration of collaboration, creativity and belonging. Our books aren't just taking us to different countries, though: they're granting us different perspectives. A professor draws consolation and inspiration from running, nature and poetry in Poverty Creek Journal; we work our way up through a teen girls' boxing championship through a series of face-offs in the electric, propulsive Headshot, while in Some Strange Music Draws Me In, we feel a lightning bolt of recognition upon meeting a kindred spirit radically different to anyone else ever met before. We'll explore the streets of New York City interwoven with a Jewish bildungsroman in the lyrical, dazzling prose of Sam Sax; we'll watch a young woman fall apart in the subtle, quietly heartbreaking pages of Mavis Gallant's Green Water, Green Sky. From student uprisings in Barcelona in the 1970s to the banks of the river Rhine in the 1850s, we're escaping the four walls around us to step instead into the world through the words of writers from across continents, languages and eras. So: step away from the keyboard, put down your phone. Come. Join us. The open road is calling.




In *Borghesia*, widow Ilaria has three cats in quick succession, each one disappearing or dying. At first comic, but becoming progressively dark, it is a delicate evocation of one life and the relationships that constrain and define it.

In both novellas, underneath a subtle, stripped-down prose and a rich cast of characters, runs a seam of unhappiness and isolation.

Natalia Ginzburg (1916–1991) wrote dozens of essays, plays, short stories and novels, including *Family Lexicon*, for which she was awarded the prestigious Strega Prize in 1963. She was involved in political activism throughout her life and served in the Italian parliament between 1983 to 1987.
